Get a clear idea of what you want

What to consider when applying...

Location – If you were successful in securing the role, how easy is it for you to travel there? If it is going to be a long journey or costly via public transport, could you see yourself doing the trip long term?

Salary - Will you be financially stable with the salary on offer?

Tailoring your application

Whilst this may be time consuming, it will help your application to stand out from the crowd.
